2014-15 State Education appropriations

- Total enacted budget: \$11.93 Billion
 Contained within this amount are the following categories:
 - Total Basic Education and Library Funding: \$10.33 Billion
 - Total Higher Education Funding: \$1.6 Billion

Equalized Subsidy for Basic Education (ESBE)

- Act 31 of 1983
 - End of the 50 percent state reimbursement guarantee
 - Factor for Educational Expense (FEE)
 - \$1,650 X MV/PI Aid Ratio X WADM
 - Minimum of a 2 percent increase
 - Additional funds based on low income students, local tax effort and population density
- Act 93 of 1984 added:
 - FEE increased to \$1,725
 - Minimum of a 3 percent increase

Equalized Subsidy for Basic Education (ESBE)

- Act 31 of 1985 added:
 - Small District Assistance
 - Minimum of a 2 percent increase
 - Maximum of a 7.45 percent increase
- Act 117 of 1986 added:
 - School Supplement
- Act 25 of 1991 added:
 - Low Expenditure/Low Wealth
 - Low Expenditure Poverty

Equalized Subsidy for Basic Education (ESBE)

- Act 16 of 1993 added:
 - Poverty
 - Enrollment growth
 - Aid Ratio
- 1994 and Beyond:
 - Hold Harmless Provisions
 - Additional Supplements

2008-09 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$5,226,142,000

- Each school district receives allocation in two pieces:
 - 1. Total allocation from 2007-08 (approx. \$4.9 billion)
 - New allocation based on phase-in of New Formula (approximately \$275 million)
 - All 464 school districts qualify for State Share Phase-In (approximately \$247 million), calculated as State Funding Target (\$2.07 billion) x 10.0% or 16.75% (if EqM > 80th %)
 - 235 school districts qualify for transition funding (approximately \$22.9 million)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Commonwealth Partnership Funding (Pittsburgh; \$4 million)

2009-10 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$4,868,741,000 Federal Appropriation: \$654,747,000

- Each school district receives allocation in two pieces:
 - 1. Base from 2008-09 (approx. \$4.98 billion); includes 2007-08 BEF, 2008-09 Commonwealth Partnership Funding, and 2008-09 Transition Funding
 - 2. New allocation based on phase-in of New Formula (approximately \$548 million)
 - All 500 school districts qualify for State Share Phase-In (approximately \$536 million), calculated as State Funding Target (\$2.32 billion) x 21.4% or 27.82% (if EqM > 80th %)
 - 95 school districts qualify for minimum increase (approximately \$10.3 million)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Commonwealth Partnership Funding (Pittsburgh; \$2 million)

2010-11 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$4,733,523,000 Federal Appropriation: \$1,042,563,000

- Each school district receives allocation in two pieces:
 - 1. Base from 2009-10 (approx. \$4.99 billion); includes 2007-08 BEF, 2008-09 and 2009-10 Commonwealth Partnership Funding, 2008-09 Transition Funding, and 2009-10 Minimum Increase
 - 2. New allocation based on phase-in of New Formula (approximately \$784 million)
 - All 500 school districts qualify for State Share Phase-In (approximately \$762 million), calculated as State Funding Target (\$2.38 billion) x 32.06%
 - 150 school districts qualify for minimum increase (approximately \$19.5 million)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Commonwealth Partnership 8 Funding (Pittsburgh; \$2 million)

2011-12 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$5,354,629,000

- Each school district receives allocation in two pieces:
 - 1. Total state and Education Jobs Fund allocation from 2010-11 (approximately \$5.12 billion)
 - 2. New allocation over 6 supplements (approx. \$233 million)
 - All 500 school districts qualify for Student-Focused Funding Supplement (approximately \$105.4 million)
 - 14 school districts qualify for ELL High Incidence, Subsidy Loss, Second Class and Personal Income supplements (approximately \$29 million)
 - 352 school districts qualify for 2008-09 Hold Harmless supplement (approximately \$100.2 million)

2012-13 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$5,403,629,000

- Each school district receives allocation in two pieces:
 - 1. Total allocation from 2011-12 (approx. \$5.35 billion)
 - 2. New allocation over 8 supplements (approx. \$39 million)
 - 7 school districts qualify for ELL High Incidence (\$17.45M)
 - 2 school districts qualify for CS Extraordinary Enrollment (approximately \$13.5 million)
 - 2 school districts qualify for Second Class County (\$1M)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Second Class SD (\$1M)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Increasing Aid Ratio (\$2M)
 - 2 school districts qualify for Personal Income (\$3.5M)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Small District Increasing Aid Ratio (\$300k)
 - 1 school district qualifies for Small District supplement (\$250k)

2013-14 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$5,526,129,000

- Each school district receives allocation in two pieces:
 - 1. Total allocation from 2012-13 (approx. \$5.39 billion)
 - 2. New allocation over 13 supplements (approx. \$129.9 million)
 - All 500 school districts qualify for Student-Focused Funding Supplement (approximately \$99.5 million)
 - Average Daily Membership (ADM) X MV/PI Aid Ratio
 - 21 school districts qualify for other 12 supplements (approximately \$30.3 million)

2014-15 Basic Education Funding (BEF)

State Appropriation: \$5,526,129,000

• Each school district receives same allocation as 2013-14

Pays August, October, December, February, April and June 1
