When graduation was approaching I still had no decision of where to go, until one day I decided to apply to a private college. This private college, accepted me, integrated me and offered me an education that I will always be thankful for.

I consider Pennsylvania my home, the place where I made the best of memories, and friends. Like me there are other undocumented students who are willing to strive for success, to work hard day and night to accomplish their dream and career they said when they were asked what they wanted to be. The Pennsylvania DREAM Act would help students reach their goals and give hope that there is still a future in place for them by allowing them to pay the in-state tuition price for public colleges and recognize the time they have lived in Pennsylvania. I along with other students want to continue an education that will provide a brighter future, while at the same time giving back to the state.

To promote the PA DREAM Act is to promote equality because there will be more access to higher education for the youth that has already been contributing to the state. It is also an investment, because the future people who will be affected by this bill could very well be the next entrepreneurs, small business owners or inventors and leaders this state and country need.
