The State Museum of Pennsylvania, a mecca for all facets of Pennsylvania history and culture, attracts more visitors than any museum between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia.

The State Capitol

Cclaimed by millions and the Capitol's architect, Joseph Huston, to be a "Palace of Art," President Theodore "Teddy" Roosevelt called it, "the handsomest building I ever saw."

The 101-year-old Capitol building officially opened on October 4, 1906, replacing a building that had been destroyed by fire in 1897. Today, with the addition of a modern East Wing built in 1987, the Capitol complex covers 5.5 acres. The outside of the five-story building is faced with

Vermont granite. The main showpiece of the interior is the Capitol Rotunda, which features a 272foot high, 52million pound dome, modeled after St. Peter's in Rome, and a sweeping Carrara marble staircase inspired by the staircase at the Paris Opera House.

The Capitol building serves as the center of the Executive, Legislative and Judicial branches of our Commonwealth. Visitors can view the House of Representatives, the Senate Chamber and the Supreme Court.

Guided tours of the Capitol are available every half hour Monday - Friday between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. On weekends and most holidays, tours are offered at 9:00 a.m., 11:00 a.m., 1:00 p.m. and 3:00 p.m. For groups of 10 or more, call 1-800-868-7672 or 717-787-6810 for advance reservations.



The Welcome Center

he Welcome Center, which was built in 1995, is located in the East Wing of the Capitol Building.

At the Welcome Center, visitors can read, listen, touch and interact with 18 colorful, informative exhibits that explore Pennsylvania's history and the legislative process.

The Welcome Center is available during the Capitol tour schedule.



The State Library

he State Library of Pennsylvania provides information for state government and citizens while collecting and preserving our state's written heritage through materials published for, by, and about Pennsylvania.

The State Library is one of the largest research libraries in the Commonwealth, and it provides information and materials from its collections and automated resources to state government, state institutions, and the general public.

Groups interested in touring the State Library should make a reservation by calling 717-705-6272. Visitors will be given a tour of each of the Library's reading rooms: the Main Reading Room; the Law and Government Publications Reading Room; the Genealogy and Local History Reading Room; and the Newspaper Reading Room.

The library is closed on all federal holidays, and operates during the

following hours:

Monday, Wednesday through Saturday – 9:00 a.m. – 4:30 p.m. Tuesday – 9:00 a.m. – 8:00 p.m.

The National Civil War Museum

et on Harrisburg's highest elevation, the National Civil War Museum is modeled after an 1850's building of brick, with plazas and a 40' cupola. The 65,000-square-foot, two-story structure includes exhibition galleries, a gift shop, auditorium and cafeteria with banquet facilities.

The museum incorporates more than 24,000 items including collections of artifacts, manuscripts, documents, photographs, and other printed material. Exhibits encompass the time period from 1850 through 1876, so its collections vary widely in scope and years of manufacture.

This is the only museum in the United States that portrays the entire story of the

American Civil War. Equally balanced presentations are humanistic in nature without bias to Union or Confederate causes. Nowhere can you find a better understanding of the Civil War, its effect on the nation and on its people.

The Governor's Residence

River, the Governor's residence sits on a three-acre lot boasting three gardens and a beautiful view of the river. The 28,600 square-foot building is two-and-a-half stories tall and flanked by two one-story wings and a garage. The Georgian-designed structure has 32 rooms and was designed by architect George Ewing.

Governor Arthur H. James authorized the purchase of land and construction of the executive residence in 1941. However, the onset of World War II delayed those plans by 25 years.

Construction began on the residence in December of 1966, and two years later, in December of 1968, Governor Raymond P. Shafer and First Lady Jane D. Shafer moved into the residence with their daughter, Jane.

The Governor's Residence is currently inhabited by Governor Edward G. Rendell and his wife, Marjorie.

Tours of the Governor's Residence are offered as follows:

April, May, June – Tuesday and Thursday – 9:30 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. September, October – Tuesday and Thursday – 10:00 a.m. – 2:00 p.m. December – Schedule varies

The tour is handicapped accessible and reservations are required. To schedule a tour, call 717-772-9130.

The State Museum

he State Museum of
Pennsylvania is the flagship of
the state's museum system, consisting of four floors of static and rotating exhibits depicting the history of the
nation and Pennsylvania. It covers all
aspects of Pennsylvania's history and
holds significant collections that trace
back to some of America's most famous
events and historical individuals.

The State Museum is the only museum in the Commonwealth where the public can experience the full expanse of the state's heritage and its connections to the national experience.

General admission to the museum is free, and it is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and on Sunday from noon to 5:00 p.m. The museum is closed on Mondays. You can reach the museum by calling 717-787-4980.
